Fruitful: More Like Jesus - Faithfulness October 23/24, 2021 Pastor Ashwin Ramani

The flavors of the fruit of the Spirit as listed in Galatians 5: 22-23 are not natural virtues that we can produce on our own but they signify the supernatural work of the Spirit. The fruit is a visible byproduct of abiding in Christ. As we take the time to abide by engaging in spiritual disciplines, God does His part by changing us from the inside out.

Abiding requires us to not only be people of faith but to be faithful in all areas of our life. Faithfulness is about being reliable and trustworthy. It means staying the course.

Maintaining focus, without giving in to distractions, is the key to faithfulness. Jesus modelled this throughout His earthly ministry by surrendering to the will and agenda of His Father. This meant that He would not worry about breaking cultural taboos but reach out to those who were marginalized and overlooked in society. Jesus' life was focused on completing the task that the Father had for him (John 4:34; 6:38). His mission included bearing God's wrath and enduring the agony of death on the cross. Jesus fulfilled God's perfect plan of redemption for our sin and our salvation. Jesus modelled faithfulness by glorifying God in completing the work He was called to. We too can glorify God by being faithful to the unique tasks that He has called us to.

In 2 Timothy 2:1-7, Paul highlights the critical role of the faithful for the message of the gospel to advance. Although it can be tempting to focus on creative ideas, strategies, talents and human abilities, it is faithful people that allow the gospel to be passed to the next generation.

A faithful person is **like a soldier** (vv 3-4). Soldiers declare their unequivocal commitment and have undivided loyalty. They obey orders and sacrifice their personal interests, even if it means hardship and danger. Nothing gets in the way of fulfilling the task. In the same way God wants us to stay focused and not compromise our commitment and loyalty to Jesus by allowing everyday life to blur and distract from our mission.

A faithful person is also **like an athlete** (v 5). In order to win the crown, an athlete has to be disciplined in every way, knowing and staying focused on the goal. They must play by the rules of the game. They willingly take the time to diligently adhere to a rigorous regime of practices. In the same way faithfulness demands such devotion. It is not a casual approach but an intentional one. But the athlete does all this for a perishable crown, something that will fade away and be forgotten. The faithful in Christ do it for eternity.

Lastly, a faithful person is **like a farmer** (v 6). The farmer is familiar with all of the stages of work necessary for the reaping of a harvest. It is an act of faith for the farmer to not yet see the harvest but to stay focused and continue laboring. In the same way, faithfulness is about working hard and staying in it for the long haul even when we don't see immediate results.

The fact that we are beneficiaries of the faithful who have gone before us, proves that God blesses the faithfulness of His followers and multiplies their efforts. Our faith goals, which are accomplished only by trusting in God's strength and power, are the link for the gospel to be passed on. These goals, similar to the fruit of the Spirit, are not attained by natural human ability.

4. What was the work the Father willed for Jesus to finish? Give 2 to 3 examples where Jesus demonstrates his faithfulness to His Father. How can these serve as a model to help us complete the work that He prepared for us?
